

Congratulations. You have decided to bolster your prayer life. There is an initial enthusiasm and eagerness. Unfortunately, it usually does not last. Spending an hour or more can be quite daunting.

We know it is a good idea, beneficial and fruitful but we doubt that we have the right stuff to do it. Hey, I am just a regular person, how can I pray for a whole hour?

One of the things I did when I came home on break from the seminary was to visit my grandmother. My mom encouraged me to visit. I had no doubt that it was the right thing to do, but I was not so eager to do it. I rather have been playing ball. For the most part Grandma was confined to a chair. She did not have a TV. Without my mom there, I quickly ran out of things to say. I would look at the clock to see if I were there long enough. I loved my Grandmother, but it was challenging to visit and occupy the time. I fretted about my meager time home and thought of other things I could be doing. Now looking back, I am so glad that I had that time with my grandmother. I may not have fully appreciated it at the time and went more out of duty, but I am so glad I had that time with her. I still

remember her words of advice to me. I am the better for it.

So, it may feel with the adoration chapel. You know it is the right thing, but we run out of things to say and do during the hour. We check our watches to see if we put in enough time. Hopefully as with my visit with my grandmother, you will learn to appreciate and value the experience.

To help you spend time with Jesus, I put together some practices. They may be of some help. How you use it is up to you. Do not be surprised if you experience dry and restless moments. Just the desire to be with the Lord honors Him. He will bless you for it. No prayer is ever wasted.

Adoration Chapel prayers

1. Read the Bible and/or Spiritual Reading.

Reading scripture is always a good thing but is especially helpful and meditative during adoration. There are many prayer books and apps that contain daily scripture readings. You may try reading the Psalms or the Gospels reflecting on a verse that speaks to you. As you read scripture, ask yourself: How is this scripture speaking to my heart? What changes is God asking me to take? How will I go about making those changes? Make this part of your prayer. You may want to bring a notebook to journal your conversations.

You may choose to read a spiritual book (many good selections in our library). I just caution you that you be sure to read and pause. Your goal is not to get done as quickly as possible. Read a little and reflect

on what you have read. Talk to Jesus about what struck you.

2. Pray the Rosary.

The rosary is a beautiful prayer, one that many saints have prayed. St. Louis de Montfort said "'When the Holy Rosary is said well, it gives Jesus and Mary more glory and is more meritorious than any other prayer." What better way to give Jesus and Mary glory than to pray the rosary in front of the Blessed Sacrament?

On large beads:

"Eternal Father we offer you the body and blood, soul and divinity, of your dearly beloved son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."

On the small beads:

V: "For the sake of His sorrowful passion"

R: "Have mercy on us and on the whole world"

At the end of the five mysteries conclude with:

"Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

(repeat three times):

4. Jesus Prayer

The Jesus Prayer, also known as The Prayer, is a short formulaic prayer esteemed and advocated especially within the Eastern churches: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God, have mercy on me, a sinner." (there are many variations to this prayer, but this is the more common). The prayer has been widely taught and discussed throughout the history of the Orthodox Church. Use your prayer beads as you pray this prayer. Say it slowly and reflectively.

5. Recite Prayers/pray for others.

Eternal Savior, Your Son came on this earth so that He could be the bread of life! Thank You, Lord, because those who come to You shall not hunger, and those who believe in You will never thirst. Thank You for satisfying our hunger and quenching our thirst! Because of You, we are made whole, because of Your sacrifice we are free!

Precious Lamb, we do not take what You did for us for granted, Amen. John 6:35

Mighty Warrior, I thank You for this special period. We gather with hearts of adoration. We continually devote ourselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, and to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Lord, we devote ourselves to the partaking of Your body and of Your blood as the Scriptures encourage us to. We partake in this so that we appreciate the fact that we have life in You, only by Your selfless sacrifice, Amen. Acts 2:42

6. Prayers of Intercession

So many people ask us for our prayers. We immediately say yes. Our response to someone's difficulties is an automatic "I will pray for you." Yet how often do we keep our commitment? Your time in the adoration chapel allows you to pray for those who

need your prayers. Make a list of names and their needs. Quietly speak the name of that person to the Lord. Ask Him to watch over them and if He wills bring healing and wholeness to that person.

Be Okay with Silence

Be still and know that I am God (Psalm 40:10) Just relax and be quiet before the Lord. Listen to what is going on inside of you. You do not always have to be busy or getting something done. Wasting time with Jesus is time well spent. The desire to be with Jesus is prayer in itself. Whatever is inside of you bring that to the Lord in prayer. Jesus told his apostles, "Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while." (Mark 6:31) May you do just that before the Lord.

Stay with me, Lord, for it is necessary to have You present so that I do not forget You. You know how easily I abandon You.

Stay with me, Lord, because I am weak and I need Your strength, that I may not fall so often.

Stay with me, Lord, for You are my life and without You I am without fervor.

Stay with me, Lord, for You are my light and without You I am in darkness.

Stay with me, Lord, to show me Your will.

Stay with me, Lord, so that I hear Your voice and follow You.

Stay with me, Lord, for I desire to love You very much and always be in Your company.

Stay with me, Lord, if You wish me to be faithful to You.

Stay with me, Lord, as poor as my soul is I want it to be a place of consolation for You, a nest of Love.

Stay with me, Jesus, for it is getting late and the day is coming to a close and life passes, death, judgment and eternity approaches. It is necessary to renew my strength, so that I will not stop along the way and for that, I need You. It is getting late and death

approaches, I fear the darkness, the temptations, the dryness, the cross, the sorrows. O how I need You, my Jesus, in this night of exile!

Stay with me tonight, Jesus, in life with all its dangers, I need You.

Let me recognize You as Your disciples did at the breaking of the bread, so that the Eucharistic Communion be the Light which disperses the darkness, the force which sustains me, the unique joy of my heart.

Stay with me, Lord, because at the hour of my death, I want to remain united to You, if not by Communion, at least by grace and love.

Stay with me, Lord, for it is You alone I look for, Your Love, Your Grace, Your Will, Your Heart,

Your Spirit, because I love You and ask no other reward but to love You more and more.

With a firm love, I will love You with all my heart while on earth and continue to love You perfectly during all eternity. Amen. - *St. Padre Pio*Litany to the Blessed Sacrament (short form)
