

FROM FATHER TOM

In the month of May, we honor our Blessed Lady. On May 13th, we celebrated the feast of Our Lady of Fatima. For the next six months, May to October, Our Lady appeared to the three Fatima children, Lucy, Jacinta and Francisco. She encouraged the recital of the daily rosary. Below is an illustration of the power of prayer, but in particular, the rosary.

When the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, everything within a one-mile radius was instantly vaporized, except for one house. On August 6, 1945, the U.S. dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, instantly leveling the city and killing over 100,000 people. Buildings were obliterated, radiation filled the air, and survival near the epicenter was considered impossible.

But just blocks from ground zero, there stood one house still intact. Inside, eight Jesuit priests. The Society of Jesus, commonly known as the Jesuits, is a Catholic religious order founded by Saint Ignatius of Loyola in 1540.

Jesuits take vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, and they serve the church through education, missionary work, and spiritual direction. These eight priests were living at the Jesuit mission house, which was located exactly one mile away from where the blast took place. Not only did they survive, but they walked out completely unharmed.

No burns, no radiation, no sickness, nothing. They lived long, healthy lives, and some even into their 80s and 90s. When people ask them how they think that they survived the devastation, they didn't claim luck, they

didn't credit science.

Instead, Father Hubert Schaeffer said, they attributed their survival to the commitment to the daily recitation of the ROSARY in adherence to the message of FATIMA. He said, we believe that we survived because we were living the message of Fatima. We lived and prayed the rosary daily in that home. They prayed the rosary every single day. Since then, for decades, doctors and scientists have studied them, looking for answers. None of the expected long-term radiation effects ever appeared.

This story defies science, but it does not defy faith. That atomic bomb had the power to level an entire city, but it couldn't touch the power of prayer.

DEL PADRE TOM



En el mes de mayo, honramos a nuestra Santísima Señora. El 13 de mayo, celebramos la festividad de Nuestra Señora de Fátima. Durante los siguientes seis meses, de mayo a octubre, Nuestra Señora se apareció a los tres niños de Fátima: Lucía, Jacinta y Francisco. Los animó a rezar el rosario diario. A continuación, se muestra una ilustración del poder de la oración, pero en particular, del rosario.

Cuando se lanzó la bomba atómica sobre Hiroshima, todo en un radio de una milla se vaporizó instantáneamente, excepto una casa. El 6 de agosto de 1945, Estados Unidos lanzó la bomba atómica sobre Hiroshima, arrasando la ciudad al instante y matando a más de 100.000 personas. Los edificios fueron destruidos, la radiación llenó el aire y la supervivencia cerca del epicentro se consideró imposible.



Pero a pocas cuadras de la zona cero, había una casa aún intacta. Dentro, ocho sacerdotes jesuitas. La Compañía de Jesús, comúnmente conocida como los Jesuitas, es una orden religiosa católica fundada por San Ignacio de Loyola en 1540.

Los jesuitas hacen votos de pobreza, castidad y obediencia, y sirven a la Iglesia mediante la educación, la obra misionera y la dirección espiritual. Estos ocho sacerdotes vivían en la casa de la misión jesuita, ubicada exactamente a una milla de donde ocurrió la explosión. No solo sobrevivieron, sino que salieron completamente ilesos.

Sin quemaduras, sin radiación, sin enfermedades, sin nada. Vivieron vidas largas y saludables, algunos incluso hasta los 80 y 90 años. Cuando se les pregunta cómo creen que sobrevivieron a la devastación, no dicen que fue suerte ni que la ciencia lo atribuyó.

En cambio, el padre Hubert Schaeffer explicó que atribuyeron su supervivencia al compromiso con el rezo diario del ROSARIO en adhesión al mensaje de FÁTIMA. Añadió: «Creemos que sobrevivimos porque vivimos el mensaje de Fátima». Vivíamos y rezábamos el rosario a diario en esa casa. Rezaban el rosario todos los días. Desde entonces, durante décadas, médicos y científicos los han estudiado en busca de respuestas. Ninguno de los efectos de la radiación a largo plazo previstos se manifestó.

Esta historia desafía la ciencia, pero no la fe. Esa bomba atómica tenía el poder de arrasar una ciudad entera, pero no pudo igualar el poder de la oración.

Fifth Sunday of Easter No Stunt Man for Jesus

Today's first and second readings seem to contradict each other. In the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas remind the other disciples that they would "undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God" (Acts 14:22). But in the second reading from Revelation, John says there will be "no more . . . mourning, wailing, or pain" (Revelation 21:4). These two sides of the Kingdom show how real our faith is. Life is frequently contradictory. A woman in labor moves from pain to joy in seconds after her child is born. She doesn't forget the pain, but knows it is necessary for the joy of new birth. Only the artist knows how much effort and pain went into the creation of a painting, sculpture, or symphony.

That's why Jesus in the Gospel talks of his coming death on the cross as the way that God will glorify him. Even God does not do things the easy way. Jesus didn't send a stunt man to take his place on the cross. It was God who was born in poverty, in a time of high infant mortality (even higher when Herod tried to kill the Child). It was God who suffered, from the Agony in the Garden through the Crucifixion.

So when Jesus tells us to love one another as he has loved us, he knows what it cost. And he also knew that his death on the cross would be the beginning of a way of love that will eventually lead to "no more death or mourning, wailing or pain." We're not there yet, but we know we are not alone in our suffering for "God himself will always be with them" (Revelation 21:3).
